

From Rabbi Guttman

This and That: The Turtle - Sticking His Neck Out

Rosh Hashanah, the first of the ten days known as the Yamim Noraim, the "Days of Awe." This period is called in Hebrew - Aseret y'mey t'shuvah – the

days of repentance.

This time of year, in terms of Judaism, is a time of renewal. It is a time for looking back, to be sure, and to acknowledge our shortcomings and deficiencies. But it is also a time for looking forward, to recognizing the enormous potential for excellence which we can still achieve, and to assessing the kind of effort such excellence requires.

A story is told of a former President of Harvard University, who kept among other objects on his desk a little model of a turtle under which was an unforgettable inscription. The statement proclaimed, "Consider the turtle. He makes progress only when he sticks his neck out".

That turtle can teach a very important lesson for leaders of any institution like ours which clings to an imperishable faith in the goodness of people and of God, and declares unconditional war on injustice, hypocrisy and corruption wherever it may be found. The turtle discomforts us with the fact that we are too often afraid to take risks for a deserving cause. We hesitate to stick out our necks for what we believe. But unless leaders do challenge the prevailing norms of what can and cannot be done, and occasionally challenge the existing standard of performance, they will never succeed.

In every generation, in every social circle, in every group--indeed in every congregation, there must be leaders who are willing to defend their ideas and ideals, even if the tide of public sentiment runs counter to their better judgment. It requires little leadership to follow the direction the crowd has chosen. It requires more than a little to CHANGE the direction of the crowd they are leading.

Ten Days for Improvement:

That takes vision and persistence and determination. And that is why real leadership is such a difficult and demanding task. That is the only quality of performance by which meaningful progress can be measured and the wellbeing of a people ensured.

These are ten days of self-examination which we Jews undertake both as individuals and as a people. During this time, we are to examine our relationships with ourselves, with others and with God. This is the ultimate self-help ritual of improving one's ethical behavior.

The next time you visit Barnes and Noble, look at how many shelves contain self-help books. Then consider how long we as Jews have been doing year after year this type of self-examination. However, after these ten days, it is time for us to go out and build our Sukkah! It is as though Jewish tradition is telling us that too much self-examination can lead to ethical paralysis!

So as we finish the High Holy days on Yom Kippur, I hope that you will emerge refreshed, ready to build your "sukkah," ready to build and strengthen relationships with your family, friends, this congregation and community and with God.

On another note:

We as rabbis and as leaders of this congregation are committed to ensuring the safety of all of our congregation! This is especially true when our children are in the building. You have been asked to help us with a generous donation to offset the additional \$25,000 that we will be spending on security this year. The bottom line is that this place is and will be a place of safety for all who enter it! However, we really need your help. If you have not given extra for this purpose, please do so and please give generously!

"It is not your duty to complete the work. Not up to you to finish it. But neither are you free to desist from it." (The Ethics of the Fathers, 2:21)

V'samachta b'chagecha...v'hayita ach same-ach. En**joy** your festival...may you have nothing but **joy**.

(Deuteronomy 16:14-15)

Languages tell you a lot about a people. You might have heard that languages spoken by those who live in cold climates have dozens of

synonyms for snow. In warmer climates, we would not be surprised if there are nuanced ways to talk about fish, fruit, or sand.

Hebrew has well over a dozen ways to say "happiness." One of the seven blessings traditionally recited at a wedding includes eight of these synonyms in rapid succession.

What does this tell us about our people that we have so many ways of indicating happiness?

It cannot be that we have only known satisfaction and joy. Our history seems to contain too many rough moments for this to be the case.

Why so many words for joy?

Children anticipate special moments in their lives. I have seen kids on their birthdays so happy just to receive something with wrapping paper. Their unbridled joy is evident even before they remove the paper to see what is inside. What a great lesson about anticipation, acknowledgment, joy, and gratitude.

As modern Jews, we have a choice as to how to view our tradition and our community. We can see these moments as a burden. Or, we can see them as a gift. The lesson that we take from Hebrew is: "What you have is a gift!" Psalm 100 takes it one step farther, reminding us to "Serve God with joy!"

We will have many opportunities to gather and to celebrate throughout this month. October of this year contains nearly all of the fall holidays, with only the start of Rosh Hashanah happening in September. How will you mark these times and see them as times of joy?

Remember, as holy as Yom Kippur is, most are surprised to learn that our ancient Sages saw it as one of the happiest days of the year! It is followed only 5 days later by Sukkot which was known by the nickname "the season of our joy." And then there is Simchat Torah, which literally means "Rejoicing With Torah," the day that we simultaneously finish the annual reading of the Torah and immediately start again from the beginning. Our festivals truly are gifts!

There is one festival which does not appear in the Torah but which our community now creates annually. This, of course, is Temple's Jewish Festival, which will happen early next month on Sunday, November 3rd. Thousands attend, both from within and beyond the Jewish community. In order to make this a reality, hundreds from Temple Emanuel need to step forward as volunteer leaders. If you haven't yet signed up to do so, I ask you to do your part. Your presence is invaluable, as are your skills. Fill that day, and every day we are blessed to be together, with happiness and joy.


