YOM HA'SHOAH

Holocaust Remembrance Day 27 Nisan 5780 | April 21, 2020

Yom HaShoah, also known as Holocaust Remembrance Day, occurs on the 27th of the Hebrew month of Nisan. Shoah, which means "catastrophe" or "utter destruction" in Hebrew, refers to atrocities that the were committed against the Jewish people during World War II. This is a memorial day for those who died in the Shoah. The Shoah is also known as the Holocaust, from a Greek word meaning "sacrifice by fire."

The Holocaust was the largest manifestation of antisemitism in recent history. Yom HaShoah reminds us of the horrors that persecuted and other Jews groups faced: forced labor, starvation, humiliation, and torture, which often resulted in death. It was a systematic effort to wipe out an entire population from the face of the earth.

Many commemorate Yom HaShoah by lighting yellow candles keep alive the to memories of the victims. Most and **Jewish** synagogues communities gather together to mark the day through worship, music and the stories from survivors.



PESACH

Passover 15-22 Nisan 5780 | April 8-16, 2020



Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) is a major Jewish spring festival, celebrating freedom and family as we remember the Exodus from Egypt more than 3,000 years ago. The main observances of this holiday center around a special home service called the seder (meaning "order"), which includes a festive meal; the prohibition on eating chametz (food made with leavened grains, including wheat, barley, rye, oats, and spelt); and the eating of matzah (an unleavened bread made specially for Passover).

On the 15th day of Nisan in the Hebrew calendar, Jews gather with family and friends in the evening to read from a book called the Haggadah, meaning "telling," which contains the order of prayers, rituals, readings, and songs for the Passover seder. The Haggadah helps us retell the events of the Exodus, so that each generation may learn and remember this story that is so central to Jewish life and history.

Passover is celebrated for either seven or eight days, depending on family and communal custom. In Israel and for most Reform Jews around the world, Pesach is seven days, but for many other Jews, it is eight days.

YOM HA'ZIKARON & YOM HA'ATZMAUT

Israeli Memorial Day & Independence Day 27 Nisan 5780 | April 21, 2020



Since the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948, four new holidays have been added to the Jewish calendar – Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day), Yom HaZikaron (Memorial Day), Yom HaAtzmaut (Independence Day), and Yom Y'rushalayim (Jerusalem Day, which celebrates the reunification of the city in 1967). In Israel, these days are observed as national holidays; around the world, they are observed in various ways by Jewish communities.

The Israeli Knesset (parliament) established the day that precedes Yom HaAtzmaut as Yom HaZikaron, a day to memorialize soldiers who lost their lives fighting in the War of Independence and subsequent battles, as well as a day to remember civilian victims of terrorism. The official State name given to the day is Yom HaZikaron LeHalalei Ma'arakhot Yisrael ul'Nifge'ei Pe'ulot HaEivah יוֹם הֹזָּכָּרוֹן לַחְלָלֵי מַעְרָכוֹת הָאֵירָה) (יוֹם הֹזָּכָרוֹן לַחְלָלֵי מְעָרָכוֹת הָאֵירָה) which means "Memorial Day for the Fallen Soldiers of Israel and Victims of Terrorism" and was enacted into law in 1963.

Yom HaAtzmaut marks the anniversary of the establishment of the modern state of Israel. It is observed on or near the 5th of the Hebrew month of Iyar on the Jewish calendar, which usually falls in April.

These are strange and scary times. I want to assure you that the entire Temple Emanuel Board of Trustees, along with the Rabbis and staff, are aware of the severity of the coronavirus situation and have been in constant contact as this situation changes daily, if not hourly. Through an abundance of caution, and in the interest of the health and safety of all our congregants, we have made the decision to close our building and cancel all activities until April 13. I am writing this in mid-March, so cannot know if that date is reasonable or just wishful thinking, but it seems right at this point. [Note-this has now been extended through April 30th]

While we are all disappointed that many scheduled activities will not happen, we are making every effort to keep connected during the next several weeks of physical distancing. As of now (things might be added or changed by the time you are reading this), we have arranged for the following:

Shabbat services on Friday evenings at 6:30 p.m. will be held on **Zoom**. If you need help with using Zoom, please let us know.

Chevra Torah will be held on Saturday mornings at 9:00 a.m. via **Zoom**.

Adult Education Classes and all **meetings** will be held via Zoom.

Some events and programs are also being livestreamed on Facebook. If you need help getting on Facebook, please let us know.

The **office staff** is mostly working from home, but we are having at least one person come in each day to answer your phone calls and deal with things like mail, payroll, deposits and payables.

All **outside events** that were scheduled to be held in the Temple building have been canceled.

The **Spring Fundraiser** "Main Event" and all hosted events through April 30th are canceled or postponed. We will make decisions regarding events scheduled after the 30th as we get closer to the date and can assess the situation. We are currently trying to figure out the logistics of having our silent auction online, so watch for info about this in the next few weeks.

We will <u>not</u> have a **Second Night Congregational Seder** in the building, but are working towards some kind of alternative option. [See page 4]

We will <u>not</u> have **Sunday or Midweek Religious School** in the building but Rabbi Koren and the teachers are working on creative online teaching and experiences. Religious School families will get separate communications about this.

We have closed **preschool** and will not reopen while Guilford County Schools are closed. Louise and the teachers are working on ways to interact with the children from afar, as well as ways to help parents with enrichment activities for their young children. Preschool families will get separate email communications about this.

We are challenging our staff, Board and Social Action Committee for creative ways to help our greater community during this time – understanding that there are many who are facing some very serious problems, such as the inability to get the food, supplies and medicines that they need. As of this writing, if you are able to safely help others, please call Jewish Family Services. We hope to have more info on other opportunities and will send that info out via email and Facebook.

We have pledged to help our seniors and most vulnerable in every way that we can. Please let us know if you know of anyone who is ill or needs help - the rabbis are asking you to be our eyes and ears.

During this terrible period of isolation and uncertainty, I want you all to know that your temple community is still here. Please take advantage of the opportunity to join your fellow congregants for online Shabbat services and other programs. Please call the office if you need to reach the rabbis or find out where to get help, or where you can help others. And, please, don't hesitate to call or email me if you have any questions or concerns, or ideas to share. You are each an important part of this sacred community, and together we will get through this crisis. Please stay healthy and take care of yourselves and all those you love.

The Plague of a Pandemic

It is difficult to imagine that in our time we are living through what in history was called a "plague."

We all know the stories of the plagues in Egypt. Now however, as we approach Passover, maybe the story of the plagues, especially when we are suffering though one, have a new meeting?

Plagues such as this pandemic have happened in the past, but who among us could have imagined that a pandemic like this would happen in our lifetime?

From 1347 to 1351, the Black Plague ravaged Europe. Jewish people were accused of causing the plague and were persecuted because of it. In our current crisis, anti-Semites once again accused the Jewish people and/or Israel of causing this plague. Fortunately, their claims are not getting a lot of traction.

For us as Jews, our most important thing is doing anything that we can to save a life. On Yom Kippur during the cholera epidemic of 1848, Rabbi Yisrael Salanter ordered that Jews that year must not abide by the traditional fast, but instead must eat in order to maintain their health. There is a legend that he went up to the synagogue pulpit on that holy day, recited the Kiddush prayer, drank and ate – as a public example for others to do the same.

As a congregation, we are doing everything in our power to help to "flatten the curve." Our building is now closed for at least a month. Services, educational offerings, including those for children, Chevra Torah and adult education classes have now been taking place in a "zoom" format. Other activities for children as well as those for older adults have also have also been moved to a digital format, such as livestreaming on Facebook.

On the original cornerstone of Temple Emanuel in 1907, there were the words "kehillah kedosha adat Yisrael – a holy community among the people of Israel." Right now we need to look at that carefully. This was the first mission statement of Temple Emanuel. Our goal right now is to become "a holy community without walls, without a building, among the people of Israel."

I want you to know that we as your rabbis are always available by phone to offer whatever comfort we might offer at this time. My cell phone number is (336) 327–7092. Please feel free to call me when you feel that I might be of help. You can even call me to vent, if you wish, if you wish about the unfairness of the situation. You can call me for a pep talk or for prayer. I am here for you!

We will be sending out significantly more email announcements than we have in the past. I would also recommend that you follow Temple Emanuel's Facebook page. If you need help in getting on Facebook, please call the office and leave us a message.

Neither Rabbi Koren nor I like the term "social distancing." What we are going to do in the next weeks and maybe even months, is "physical distancing," not "social distancing." Our challenge is for us to be in touch. Please become our eyes in years as far as people in the congregation are concerned. Let us know if someone needs our help or when someone, heaven forbid, is ill.

May God bless us all at this time with health and peace. Together, by being connected, we will overcome this horrible pandemic and will indeed emerge as a strong and holy congregation among the people of Israel.

Dear Temple Emanuel – I truly hope that we will be together in person again soon. I miss everyone tremendously. I want to thank you for the times that we have spoken on the phone, gathered for services and prayers, and that you have viewed Temple's livestreams.

Please join my family and me for the 2nd Seder of Passover this year. See page 4 for more information. This seder will feel a bit different. Yet, I am hopeful that it will help us connect not only to our traditions, our story, and God, but also to one another.

One of the best-known sections of the Passover seder comes from the Haggadah's Four Questions:

Mah nishtana ha-lailah ha-zeh mi-kol ha-lailot? Why is this night different than all other nights?

Difference is the word of our time. But what is amazing is that it is not just a few of us whose lives are different. We are all going through this together. In a short period of time, our world reshuffled. We could see it happen, place to place, over days, weeks,

Passover will arrive in just a few days and the world that most of us inhabit feels different. This is not just one night, but an extended period of time. We still do not know the outcome of all of this.

It is likely that years from now we will look back and remember how:

- On all other years we could be together in person with family and friends in our homes and at Temple. But this year, just in our homes with no outside guests.
- On all other years we washed our hands only twice during the seder and did so rather quickly. But this year, hand washing for at least 20 seconds with soap and water has become so essential that we might do it before and after every step of the seder.
- On all other years we might be able to "double dip" or share dishes with one another. But this year, such sharing of food is a distant memory. Yet, making sure that those who might otherwise go without should be an even higher priority.
- On all other years stepping aside from the hustle of the world around us and "reclining" was a sign of freedom. But this year, it is a sign of responsibility for our elders, the infirm, and all humanity.

Now, more than ever, the Jewish emphasis on community over individual has come through. For millennia we have placed the whole over the parts. How much the more so is this true now!

I am convinced that when we look back on this they crucial question will not be "did I make it through?" the main question will be "did we make it through?"

Working together, our actions during this time of difference may just make all the difference!

Early Childhood & Family Engagement



Have you ever seen a child open a new toy and they are more interested in the packaging than the toy? Children prefer play that stimulates their curiosity and gives free reign to their imaginations. A great way to enhance their curiosity is to introduce a

variety of materials we call "loose parts" into their play settings.

Loose parts are beautiful found objects and materials that children can move, manipulate, and change while they play. These materials can be carried, combined, and lined up. There is no specific set of directions. Loose parts can be used alone or combined with other materials. Loose parts can be turned into whatever a child desires. They offer multiple outcomes and can be joined together in many ways.

Loose parts invite conversations and interactions. They encourage collaboration and cooperation. Through using loose parts, children's creativity and innovation are developed. All of these are highly valued skills in life today.

The term loose parts is not new. It was coined by British architect Simon Nicholson in 1971. He saw people of every age as potentially creative. He believed the

richness of the environment depended on the opportunities it provided for making connections. When an environment is rich in loose parts, children are likely to discover multiple ways to manipulate them. Children discover new ways of thinking and use knowledge learned by playing with these materials.

Loose Parts include:

- ⇒ Buttons, plastic tops from pouch snacks, washers
- ⇔ Bottle caps, shells, bolts
- Corks, acorns, keys

COCONUT MACAROONS FOR PASSOVER

INGREDIENTS

- ◆ 1 pkg. (14 oz.) or 5 1/3 cups
 flaked coconut
- ⇒ 1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- ↑ 1 teaspoon almond extract

Prep Time: 5 Minutes
Cook Time: 10 minutes
Total Time: 15 minutes
Makes: 48 Cookies

INSTRUCTIONS

PREHEAT oven to 350° F. Foil-line and grease baking sheets.

COMBINE coconut, sweetened condensed milk, vanilla extract and almond extract in large bowl. Drop by rounded teaspoonful on prepared baking sheets; press each cookie lightly with back of spoon.

BAKE for 10 to 14 minutes or until lightly browned around edges. Immediately remove from baking sheets to wire racks to cool. Store loosely covered at room temperature.

FOR COCONUT AND CHOCOLATE MACAROONS:

STIR into dough 1/4 cup semi-sweet chocolate mini morsels. Proceed as above.

FUDGY CHOCOLATE-WALNUT COOKIES

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 cup plus 3 tablespoons unsweetened Dutch-process cocoa powder
- 4 large egg whites, at room temperature
- † 1 tablespoon pure vanilla extract

Prep Time: 25 Minutes Cook Time: 20 minutes Total Time: 45 minutes Makes: twelve 4-inch

cookies

INSTRUCTIONS

PREHEAT the oven to 350°. Position 2 racks in the upper and lower thirds of the oven. Line 2 large rimmed baking sheets with parchment paper.

SPREAD the walnut halves on a large rimmed baking sheet and toast in the oven for about 9 minutes, until they are golden and fragrant. Let cool slightly, then transfer the walnut halves to a work surface and finely chop them.

WHISK the confectioners' sugar in a large bowl, with the cocoa powder and salt. Whisk in the chopped walnuts. Add the egg whites and vanilla extract and beat just until the batter is moistened (be careful not to overbeat or it will stiffen). Spoon the batter onto the baking sheets in 12 evenly spaced mounds.

BAKE the cookies for about 20 minutes, until the tops of the cookies are glossy and lightly cracked and feel firm to the touch; shift the pans from front to back and top to bottom halfway through.

SLIDE the parchment paper (with the cookies) onto 2 wire racks to cool completely before serving.

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
